Rabbi's Message

On Pesach we were granted "physical" freedom by G-d from slavery in Egypt. On Shavuot, we will be granted "spiritual" freedom when we celebrate the gift of Torah by the Holy One to the Jewish people. From the second day of Passover, we began a 49 day countdown to this momentous occasion. In the days of the Temple, an omer (measurement) of barley was brought to the Temple as a grain offering on each of the 49 days leading up to Shavuot.

Many Jews consider this period a time of semi-

mourning where secular celebrations are forbidden. During the first 33 days of the "Omer," a plague killed 24,000 students of the famous Talmudic author, Rabbi Aki-ba. They died because they lacked respect for each other. While perhaps a harsh punishment, our Rabbis declared that Torah learning becomes meaningless if one is not a decent human being. On the 33rd day of the Omer, LAG B'Omer, the annihilation ceased. The other historical event was the death of the author of the Kabbalah, Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai. The Ren Shimon decreed that on his yahrzeit (anniversary), a great celebration should be

held each year. Today, many individuals celebrate Lag B'Omer with picnics and barbecues. In Israel, people visit the reputed graveside of this saintly individual at Meron. This period of semi-mourning resumes from the 34th day of the Omer until Shavuot. Other significant historical events that occurred during the Counting of the Omer include: the commemoration of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising against Nazi oppression; Yom HaZikaron honoring Israel's fallen soldiers; and Yom Haatzmaut, Israeli Independence Day. began during Pesach.

One can only imagine how it must have felt to be at Sinai almost 3300 years ago. "With a mighty hand and an outstretched arm" G-d led you out of Egypt. You were accompanied by over 600,000 Israelite soldiers and their families who escaped from the tyranny of Pharaoh. You witnessed G-d's wrath during the Ten Plagues. Our Heavenly Parent provided "manna" for sustenance and the promise of your own nation. This land would flow with "milk and honey." The Torah which you were about to receive would become

your blueprint for the creation of civil, religious and social society. The Israelite nation would become an "Ohr La Olam"--- a cultural light to the nations as they assumed the role of G-d's Chosen People. No wonder our ancestors prayed all night at the foot of Mt. Sinai in anticipation of G-d's present to our people. That is why the most important of the names given to Shavuot is "Zaman Matan Toratenu."--The Giving of OUR Torah. This timeless gift is given annually to every generation of the Jewish people---as if we too had been standing at Sinai.

In honor of this momentous occasion, Jews around the world will study either all night or as late as possible on Erev

Shavuot. Your participation in our annual Tikkun La'el Shavuot, held this year on Saturday May 26th beginning at 7PM, is critical for the perpetuation of Torah learning in Racine. A dairy meal will follow a brief holiday service and prior to our learning session. (During the weeks prior to Shavuot, Temple members are encouraged to submit topics to me they would like discussed.) Shavuot morning service, including Yizkor, will be held on Sunday morning, May 27th.

Sisterhood

The suggested contribution is a minimum of \$36 for a dairy meal and \$54 for a meat luncheon, however you may contribute any amount you wish. Another way anyone can contribute to an oneg is to donate food. These contributions are always appreciated. They help to stretch the Sisterhood's budget by reducing grocery costs and expanding the variety of foods available to serve. Feel free to contribute anything you'd like. Crackers, fresh fruits, store-bought cakes and cookies, hummus, pretzels, potato chips, and sturdy fresh vegetables (such as carrots and celery) and fruit are always needed. If you have access to kosher cheeses and/or deli meats where you shop or when you are in a larger city, please consider buying extra. Folks really enjoy them as these items are usually not available in kosher form in Racine. All we ask is that the foods be certified kosher (with the exception of fresh fruits and vegetables) so that we can keep our kosher kitchen kosher. We also need things like paper towels, styrofoam cups, plates, napkins, etc. If you have any questions about what is needed, just give Rita a call.

Being a Small Congregation is Different - by Mary Hofmann - Congregation Etz Chaim, Merced, CA (part 1)

It's different quantitatively, of course. We don't have as many members as they have in large congregations. But--even more so -- it's different qualitatively from large congregations. There are things they have that we don't. But there are other things--very important things--that we have that they don't. And a lot of them are spending a lot of time and money trying to capture--or recapture--that something we have.

WE HAVE A SENSE OF FAMILY. We have members we get along with, and members who drive us crazy. But there aren't enough of us that we can afford to get uppity. We need each other. And so we care about each other, and we know that every last one of us is important. We aren't an institution. We're still people.

WE HAVE A SENSE OF TENACITY. We know how fragile our presence is and how important it is that we stay alive, stay involved and stay together--no matter what. So we do.

WE HAVE A SENSE OF INVOLVEMENT. When organizational research indicates that most organizations operate on an average level of involvement of 5 percent of the membership, it's rewarding to know that most of us are involved most of the time.

WE HAVE A SENSE OF PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY TO THE CONGREGATION. When everyone depends on you, you tend to carry through. You might not always want to, but you do what you have to do, and you usually end up glad that you did.

WE HAVE SENSE OF TOLERANCE. We often exist in areas isolated from mainstream Jewish life where many (if not most) of our marriages are (or were) mixed, and where some of our best friends aren't Jewish. And our kids' best friends aren't Jewish either. We focus less on turning in on ourselves than on sharing what we have with others so they can see that we have something worth working for.
